Handicap flags for golf carts

We have had a few members ask if we would consider bringing back these flags. After discussions with the Golf Advisory Board, we drafted up a new Handicap Policy. This new policy along with the flags will start as soon as our new carts arrive.

This is the new policy. If you currently meet the requirements please print this form off, sign it and return it to Pro Shop.

1. Handicap flags can be obtained at the Pro Shop prior to playing.
2. On days when carts are restricted to paths only, all players must stay on the paths.
3. Carts must stay on paths from the beginning of each hole until carts have passed the "cart scatter" signs.
4. All carts with flags must stay a minimum of 20 yards from the front side and rear of any greens complex.
5. Carts will stay out of all native grasses, wooded areas, and hazards.
6. Any hole marked "cart path only" means no carts are allowed on the hole, including handicap flagged carts.
7. When on the course, it is the driver's responsibility to avoid any wet areas. Wet areas are easy to see, so there is no reason to drive through them.

To be approved for a handicap flag, you must have one of the following.

- Handicap permit for your vehicle.
- Doctors note stating that your health warrants a need for a flag to play.
- Special one day permission from Pro Shop staff.

I have read and fully understand these handicap flag rules for the cart. If I do not follow these rules the following will take place:

First offense: I will receive a verbal warning.

Second offense: I will receive a documented warning.

Third offense: I will lose handicap privileges permanently.

Final offense: If I take carts where they don't belong, my membership will be canceled and I will be due no refunds of any fees that I have already paid.

By following these rules, you should be able to enjoy your day at Carolina Colours Golf Club while keeping the golf course in the best possible condition.

The Pro Shop does have the right to refuse issuing a handicap flag for any reason.

Tournament Committee

The Carolina Colours tournament season is in full swing and we have successfully completed the first six months of tournaments, some with the course maximized with players. While the feedback that we received has been mostly positive, we have noticed that some of our tournaments have observed late cancellations and no shows.

We realize that some of these are unavoidable and excusable such as medical emergencies. This policy, however, is meant to address non-emergency cancellations or no shows which unfortunately result in our Pro Shop staff having to reorganize tee sheets, pairings and flights, and in larger tournaments where food has been planned and purchased, excess food is sometimes wasted resulting in a monetary loss.

The Tournament Committee was asked to develop a policy which could be used as a rule set to govern the handling of this problem. The following set of rules was developed and will be used to reduce the impact of late cancellations.

- ⇒ A person may cancel from a tournament for which food is planned three days before the tournament. Note that food is usually purchased three days before a tournament.
- ⇒ If a person cancels within THREE DAYS of the tournament for which food has been purchased, they are still responsible for the food portion of their entry fee. Emergencies are exempt. Weather is not exempt except when a tournament is cancelled. The Pro Shop will decide on questionable excuses.
- ⇒ LATE ARRIVAL in a tournament is defined as not being on the putting green in time for final instructions or not checked in at the start of a tournament. In a COUPLES EVENT, the late couple can still play but will not be eligible for prize money. The other couple may still play and compete for prize money if they have a marker person to validate their score.
- ⇒ If the Tournament is an individual event and the person does not show up on time, they are disqualified from receiving prize money. If it's a team tournament and the entire team does not show up on time, the entire team is disqualified from receiving prize money. But if at least one person DOES show up on time, that team can compete for prize money. If additional team members show up late, they can join their team on the tee of the next complete hole.

Please remember that we want maximum attendance in our tournaments and we want everyone to have a great time. Our purpose here is not to arbitrarily punish anybody, but to reduce tardiness and no shows. We hope that this policy statement is a step towards that.

Par for the Course

Par For the Course- Peter Eckle

This month we're going to touch on a few items that when they happen, you want to be 100% sure how to handle to avoid penalty strokes.



The first happens more than we would like to think- **playing the wrong ball**. Ironically, when it happens, we all somehow hit the shot of our life. So what happens and what do you do? In stroke play, the player gets the general penalty (two penalty strokes) and must correct the mistake by continuing play with the original ball by playing the ball from its original spot or taking relief under the Rules. The good news in stroke play, the stroke made with the wrong ball and any

more strokes before the mistake is corrected (including strokes made and any additional penalty strokes solely from playing that ball) **do not count**. In match play, it means loss of hole. In stroke play, if the player does not correct the mistake before making a stroke to begin another hole or, for the final hole of the round, before returning their scorecard, the player is **disqualified**. How to avoid all this?- always check your ball to confirm it's yours, even if you have to mark it and pick it up to confirm.

What happens when you **can't find your ball**? You have 3 minutes from the time you start searching, then it's **lost**. When this happens, one option is to return to the spot of your previous stroke and play another ball from there for one penalty stroke (see Rule 18.2b). That is referred to as stroke and distance. However, if it is **known or virtually certain** where the ball came to rest on the course (in a penalty area for example) or where it crossed a hazard, you may substitute another ball playing from that location rather than from the previous shot location. Still a 1 stroke penalty, but no distance penalty.



What happens if an **out of bounds marker** interferes with your stance or swing? Your first instinct might be to remove the stake, like you might do with a red stake. Don't do it. If you do it by mistake, but put it back before you make your shot. No problem. If you don't it's a 2 stroke penalty in stroke play and loss of hole in match play. Unlike red or yellow stakes, out of bounds stake define the course boundaries and cannot be moved.

Terri's Tips!

I've been hearing a lot of talk about how long the rough is these past few days! Grass grows fast in these parts! Even our front lawn!!

If you find yourself in the rough, the deep rough where the grass is over the top of the ball, you can escape! And on the first try:

- * Don't try to be a hero, which means at times you must take your medicine. If you know you can't reach the green, and even a slight chance you can, take a step back and follow the advice below.
- * Choose a club that has a lot of loft in the face. Any club from the 7 iron through SW. Why you may ask—it's easier for the club face to get to the ball with a more descending / direct blow. The long grass will grab the club fast, twisting it. If you choose a long club, chances are the club face will turn from the grass grabbing it. It will take whatever loft you have off, resulting in the ball staying in the rough.
- * *Make sure you play the ball right of center in your stance, closer to your right foot for right hand players, closer to your left foot for lefties. This will ensure a more direct strike and the face of the club getting closer to the ball before the grass has a chance to twist and turn it.
- * *Choose your shortest exit to the fairway. Don't try to carry a bunker or carry more rough, chances are you won't and you'll end up staying in the rough or ending up in a fairway bunker. And that's another article for another time—fairway bunker shots!
