Ken Gerhardt's Comments

The golf course has turned green and grass will start to grow in May. The team has been mowing everything but the rough, which will start late May or early June. They have been hard at work on bunkers and drainage. There is still more to do but they have been knocking out the list.

The bunkers on 17 will be completed mid to late May. This should allow the top two bunkers to drain properly. The first bunker closest to the white tee box will be filled with dirt and sodded. This will mean that anyone walking the course will need to stay on the path until they get past the first tree just right of the cart path and towards the yellow tee box. The area between the yellow tee box and the first bunker will be extremely wet after any rain as that's where we are directing the water to flow.

Calling 911 from the course

As we have many new property owners as well as golf members, I want to remind everyone what to do if you need to call 911 while on the course.

Many years ago, I worked with the New Bern Police department to GPS our course. This would help all emergency vehicles know where to go in case of an emergency. Here is the protocol if needed. Just an FYI, emergency vehicles are permitted to drive down any cart path they need in order to get to the person needing help. This information is also located on the golf carts lower windshield sign holder.

EMERGENCY ON THE GOLF COURSE

- Call 9-1-1.
- Tell the operator you are on the Carolina Colours Golf Trail. [Right, it makes no sense, but because of a misunderstanding, this is how we are listed for Emergency Medical Services]
- Tell the operator what hole you are on. [The Course has been previously GPSmapped, so this info will help them get to the exact spot quickly].
- If possible, please notify the Pro Shop: 252-772-7022, #1. This will help with providing further instructions to the first responders.

Purple tees on holes four and nine

At the request of those that play the purple tees, I approached the Golf Advisory Board about the possibility of moving these tee markers up on these two holes. The reason was, they simply couldn't get over the hazard on four. This forced them to layup in front of the hazard. On nine playing from the yellow tee location made the hole too long.

The board approved the moving of these two tee boxes. We have reached out to the CGA requesting them to give us a new rating for these two holes. Hopefully, we will hear back from them shortly. The printed scorecards will not reflect any changes. If changes are approved by the CGA we will update GHIN along with any scorecards we print in-house for tournaments. In the meantime, if you play from the purple tee box, please post your score like you have always done.

Personal golf cart usage on the course

Over the past month I have noticed numerous violations of those using personal carts. So here is a reminder just to refresh your memory.

Personal golf carts entering the course from home:

A friendly reminder of what our policy is for entering and exiting the golf course with a personally owned cart. Not following these rules may result in golf cart privileges being revoked.

- All member owned golf carts and golf bikes may only enter or exit the course via the main driveway from Waterscape, hole #1 from Sienna Trail or hole #9 from Waterscape. When using holes #1 or #9, only paved cart paths should be used.
 - If there are golfers on hole #1 or #9 when you attempt to enter or exit the course, please return to the road, and enter or exit the course through the main driveway. If there is no one on the hole you may proceed, with caution, onto or away from the course.
 - Please be aware of pedestrians, other golfers, and maintenance staff when they enter or exit the course. DO NOT interrupt play when entering or leaving the course.

Leaving the golf course to head home

When leaving the course, it is best to simply take Waterscape Way. You won't know if there are golfers on the holes you are trying to drive down until it's too late.

My experience

I was on hole one and a personal cart went right by me as I was getting ready to hit. This past week, Johnny and I were on hole three just past the hazard when a member drove their cart on the cart path past us and kept on going. They then saw someone on hole four tee box and turned right to cut across the tee box and drove through the woods and onto Creekscape. To say the least, Johnny and I were shocked to watch this happen.

Also, please keep all personal carts from driving around the back part of the pool complex and off the dirt path that exits on Waterscape in front of the pool.

I look forward to seeing you on the course, in the café, or at a Friday night dinner.



News from the Pro by Jim Ferree, PGA

As the course here at Carolina Colours continues to green up and improve, we can expect the volume of members, guests, and public play to increase. With the tee sheet filling up, now is a good time to review some tools and techniques to aid all of us with pace of play.

<u>Tools</u>

- 1. Our Cart Fleet is equipped with GPS which gives golfers immediate and accurate yardages to aid players with strategies and club selection.
- 2. Our course offers 7 sets of tees that players can choose from to match distance with skill level making each golfer's round both efficient and enjoyable.
- 3. Penalty areas on our course are well-defined to reduce confusion on how to continue play.
- 4. The Pro Shop has the ability to monitor all of our carts out on the course and the GPS tracks each cart so we can tell if groups are on-pace or falling behind. The Pro Shop can send friendly messages to any cart that is losing pace and ask them to please keep up with the group in front of them or let faster groups play through.

<u>Techniques</u>

- 1. Beginning golfers who generally need more time to play should try to choose less active times to play and can opt to play 9 holes instead of 18.
- 2. When players in a group hit from different tees, pair players hitting from the same tees together in a cart when possible.
- 3. Each player should always be planning their next shot when possible without distracting others in their group.
- 4. Watch where your playing partners' balls go and mentally mark where the ball went (especially when hitting into the sun). This reduces the area of search, saves times, and shows much consideration for your fellow golfer.
- 5. If cart partners hit in different areas, drive to the ball further away and either drop that player off with a couple of clubs and drive over to your ball or, leave the cart with them and walk to your ball with clubs you'll likely use while they are preparing to hit.
- 6. Offer to hit out of turn if someone who is away is having difficulty playing their shot (ex. needs a different club or has to get a sand rake).

These are just a few suggestions that hopefully will reduce the time it takes for your round and increase enjoyment. Remember that proper golf etiquette requests you let faster players play through if your group loses pace with the group ahead.

Pace of Play

Pace of play is determined by your relationship to the group in front of you. Ideally, stay within one shot of that group, and always be sure to keep them in sight.

Ready Golf serves to facilitate a more acceptable pace of play. Ten suggestions for Ready Golf are:

- 1. Play as soon as it is safe to do so. Be ready to hit immediately when it is your turn.
- 2. Do not stand on formality and honors. Whoever gets to the tee first hits.
- 3. Always think ahead so you are ready when it is your turn, i.e. be thinking about yardage and club selection while approaching your ball.
- 4. Hit your ball before helping to search for one.
- 5. Line up your putt before it is your turn.
- 6. Putt out (on short putts) rather than marking and waiting.
- 7. Limit conversation on the green.
- 8. Leave your cart or bag off to the side of the green and toward the next tee. NEVER leave your cart or bag in front of the green.
- 9. Enter scores on the next tee box. Do NOT enter scores on the green or in the cart to the side of the green.
- 10. Hold used clubs after your shots and putts and put them back in your bag at the next stop or tee box.

Of course, there are many more suggestions to facilitate Ready Golf and pace of play, but, hopefully the ten items above will serve as a great start.

Additionally, please consider searching the internet for more suggestions and articles on the subject.

May Flower's May Bring Golf Power's!


Is there anyone out there who would like to hit the golf ball longer?!

This is probably one of the most frequent questions I get asked: how can I hit the golf ball longer? Why am I losing distance? Why is it that all my irons seem to go the same distance?

Well, there are many reasons why this could be happening. Given the fact that we are all getting older and we are not as strong or flexible as we used to be, we can set that aside and improve other aspects of our swing that could lead to more distance and consistency on the golf course.

Do you have the proper grip to maximize your distance? Most of my students hold the golf club that leads to less power. Similar to the 'weak grip' picture below.

You want to have a 'strong grip', which means if you look down you should see at least two knuckles on your left hand. Your left thumb should be placed towards the right side of your grip. And the arrows you see should be pointing between your chin and your right shoulder. See the pictures below. You will want either the neutral grip or the strong grip. If you are holding the club in the 'weak grip' position, you need to change to a neutral or strong grip.



Another aspect I see which leads to less distance and power is the way my students use their wrists in their swing.

Many of my students don't understand how powerful the wrists are for developing clubhead speed. If you visualize yourself using a hammer to hammer a nail into a board, you will apply more force to that nail if you use your wrist to move the end of the hammer versus just moving your forearm up and down.

The picture below shows the proper angle of the wrist and forearm during the beginning of your swing—also known as the take away. My students who have a hard time with distance will take the club back similar to the first photo and from there just lift their arms up. My students who apply proper force to the ball will take the club back similar to the second photo, 'hanging' their wrist to set the angle you see in photo number two. This motion will allow you to develop more club head speed, which will allow you to produce more force at impact and gain you a few more yards!





Par for the Course—Peter Eckle

Knowing the rules helps you avoid having to play in difficult situations, so you can play better and lower your scores. One of the best examples of this involves immovable obstructions and knowing when to take proper relief from them.

Consider hole number 2 and the fan that is left of the green. (The image below is looking back from the green.)



Many a golf shot has found its way left of the green. Some near the fan, some not so near, and some with the fan between the ball and the flag stick on the green. The first thing you have to know is, your ball does not have to be touching an immovable obstruction to get free relief.

Interference can be with your lie, stance, swing, or line of play. So, in this case A and C are clearly entitled to free, complete relief. And in the case of B, there is no interference, so no relief. What about D? D is in the penalty area, so despite the fact there is interference with the fan, there is no relief in a penalty area. In the case of A and C, knowing the rules and you get to avoid a difficult shot by taking relief. If you try it with B and D, it's not allowed and you would be penalized assuming your playing partners know the rules.


