Scorecards

Over the past few months, the marketing committee has been working on a new design to replace our current scorecard with an updated version. We've been using the same card since opening. Designing this card meant rethinking the layout, wording, and functionality of the card. Once a layout was decided, we realized we would need to remove some of the items currently on the existing card due to space limitations. The group felt the easiest thing to remove was the pin placements. This freed up the space needed as well as gave us additional space on the card that we keep at the top of the windshield. These new cards will be in place by the end of October.

Pin Placement

As you just read, we had to rethink our pin placement with the new scorecards. When the new scorecards go into place, so will our new flags and pins. We will be using checkered flags which will consist of red/white, black/white, and blue/white. We will also be changing the flagsticks with coordinated colored sticks... red, black, and blue. This will make them each stand out and be easier to see.

On Fridays we will use the American flags on holes 9 and 18. These will be marked with the correct color of flagstick to guide you on placement. The scorecards will list the color placement, so you won't have to remember.

Sign up procedure for all member tournaments

Over the past year, our members have had the luxury of signing up on our new website. This has been great as the new website looks amazing. With that said, we've learned several things that have made this sign-up process work for our members, but not necessarily so much for our Pro Shop staff. Some of the challenges became evident over the last few months.

Members could sign up for an entire year to play in any of the events. The challenge with this is that many of our members would forget they signed up and simply don't show up. Another challenge is that once we set the game up the night before, a member could cancel their sign up and the Pro Shop has no way of knowing this. The next day we must print out the list and do a name-by-name comparison to see who's missing. Not an easy task for any event.

So now the great news! We will be changing our sign-up process December 1st. One thing we learned after Brian left is that Golf Genius does way more than what we were using it for. This system allows a member to not only sign up, but it puts the names into the system and they are there when we get ready to set up the event. We can preset emails that will go out automatically to our membership for sign up.

So, let's say we set up the signup day for our Wednesday MGA to be on Sundays. On Sunday, every MGA player would receive an email asking you to click on 'play' or 'not play.' It will send the player's name, index, and preassigned tees to the Golf Genius system. There will be an automatic cutoff date that will be shared with the player. If the person tries to add or cancel after the cutoff date, they will need to call the Pro Shop directly. This helps the Pro Shop manage the event. This is just 5% of what it can do. So many more details will be coming over the next month.

We're currently doing a test run with a few members from both the MGA & LGA to work out if there are any kinks or questions prior to setting it up for everyone.

One of the most important items we found is that the email you use for your GHIN handicap must match the one we use for Golf Genius. There's about 12 that currently don't match. If a husband and wife currently share an email address, as long as this matches in both GHIN and Golf Genius it's fine.

Please be on the lookout for future communications on this. I do need to take a moment and thank Larry Napolis for all his guidance with this project. Larry lives in Taberna. He happens to have vast knowledge with Golf Genius and has agreed to help us understand it's capabilities. Larry has also agreed to do a few training sessions in November with our membership if needed.

We wouldn't have a clue that all this was possible in the system without his help so Larry, Thanks for all your time and energy with this!

Bunker update

On September 21st, Josh and his team started working on greenside bunkers. There are two phases to this project. First, do the easy ones. Bunkers that simply need more sand and can be done quickly will be noticeable to all immediately. There are 21 bunkers that fit this category.

- # 2 Both
- # 4 Green side left and first one on the right
- # 5 right side of green
- # 6 right side
- # 7 left side of green
- # 9 all three right of green
- # 10 pot bunker and right side of green
- # 11 left side of green
- # 13 right side of green
- # 14 behind green
- # 16 all three
- # 17 left and back of green
- # 18 left of green

Second is the harder part of the project, where we will be digging out the silt, checking drains, and adding new sand. These will be worked on starting in November, maybe sooner if time allows. There are 10 bunkers in this category.

- # 1 right side
- # 3 back two behind green
- # 4 second on right side
- # 5 left side of green
- # 7 right side of green
- # 8 left side of green
- # 11 both right of green
- # 13 left side of green
- # 17 in front of green

Once we get these completed, we will start work on fairway bunkers where needed.

We simply can't stop and start each time a golfer gets close if we are to complete this project in a timely fashion. We hope you will understand. Once you get on the green, we will stop the equipment.





Par for the Course by Peter Eckle

Provisional Ball—Rule 18.3

When you see a player motion like this, indicating a ball may be headed out of bounds or perhaps consumed in a hazard, then most likely what will come next might be a provisional ball, just in case the ball may be out of bounds or lost.

There are some things that are good to know in order to proceed correctly when this situation arises.

1. You can only play a provisional ball if you think your ball may be lost outside of a water hazard or out of bounds. (This part of the rule is often misunderstood because most players play a provisional anyway in the interest of maintaining pace of play).
2. If you are virtually certain that your ball is in a water hazard or in a red stake hazard where it is findable, then you should not hit a provisional ball. If you do it anyway, then you lose the right to drop a ball laterally 2 club lengths from the hazard and the provisional ball you hit becomes your ball in play.
3. Make sure you announce that you intend to play a provisional ball. Believe it or not, you must say the word “provisional.” None of this “I think I’ll reload” or “Better hit another.”
4. When you hit a provisional ball because you think your ball is lost or OB, think about this:
 - Use a ball that is distinguishable from the first ball.
 - Most provisional balls end up much straighter than the first shot and often in the fairway!
 - Even if the provisional ball is the best shot you hit in your life, you cannot declare your original ball lost, but you can choose not to even look for it. (Isn’t this a crazy game?)
 - You can hit the provisional ball as many times necessary to reach the spot where your ball may be lost.
 - You have 3 minutes to locate a lost ball and the time does not start until you have reached the area where you think it is lost.
 - Use your phone as a timer—“Hey Siri/Google time 3 minutes.”
 - If you find your original ball, you can disregard the provisional ball and any of the shots made with it!
 - If you don’t find your original ball, then you proceed with the provisional under stroke and distance rules.
 - If your original ball is found, but deemed to be unplayable, you cannot play the provisional Ball. You must play the original ball under stroke and distance rules options.
5. Rule 18.3 is clearly one of the murkiest rules to contend with, which is why many clubs set a local rule to amend it and help maintain pace of play.



Terri's Tips!

Play the Game—Not Your Swing

Golf can be a tough game to play, if you are thinking about your swing while on the golf course, or “HOW” to hit a golf shot, or ‘TRYING’ too hard.

What other sport do you have time to think about the move before it happens? Not many. As with most other sports, you are reacting to something coming towards you. Baseball, tennis, pickleball. Even driving your car. Do you think about what you must do as you approach the stop sign? I doubt it, you just react.

React is a good way to play golf. React to what is in front of you, on the golf course. Thinking and trying your golf swing should be left on the practice range. Golf is also the only sport I know that is not taught on the playing field. The golf swing is not the golf game. Yes, it is a huge piece of it, but it's not the game.

If you need to hit a high soft shot, you visualize, you feel, and you just do. If you are thinking about your hands, your wrist, “how” to hit the shot, you are not reacting—you are internalizing it! The more shots you know how to execute, the better player you will become.

GET OUT OF YOUR OWN HEAD & WAY. Get into the golf course and execute the shot that it is telling you to hit! The mental part of the game is, at times, the most difficult part of “playing the game.”

CHEF's CORNER

Marinated Skirt Steak with Chimichurri

Great end of summer grilling is the best!

Skirt steak is a long cut of beef that's sliced thinly from the diaphragm muscles of the cow. It is one of the most flavorful cuts of beef, but can be a little on the tougher side because of the connective tissue in the cow's diaphragm muscles. That's where marinades come in to help tenderize the meat.

The marinated flavor is unreal. Because of the texture of skirt steak. I wanted to make sure I used a marinade recipe that would really infuse a ton of flavor and also help to tenderize the meat.

The ingredients contained in this marinade including:

olive oil	orange juice
lime juice	soy sauce
Worcestershire sauce	apple cider or red wine vinegar
minced garlic	

Ingredients like lime juice and soy sauce add acid to really break down the toughness of the steak, and it couldn't taste better if you ask me. That citrus essence gets right down in each and every bite. Put your completed marinade in a resealable plastic bag and add your steak pieces. Refrigerate and marinate for 6 to 7 hours.

Ingredients

For the Marinade and Grilling:

2/3 cup olive oil
1/2 cup fresh orange juice
1/3 cup fresh lime juice
1/4 cup soy sauce
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
3 tablespoons apple cider or red wine vinegar
4 garlic cloves minced
1 pound skirt steak
Salt and pepper to taste

For the Chimichurri Sauce:

1 cup fresh parsley
1 cup fresh cilantro
1/4 to 1/3 cup olive oil
1/2 medium onion diced
3 garlic cloves
3 tablespoons fresh lime juice
2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Optional: 1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes

Instructions

For the Marinade and Grilling:

Whisk all the ingredients together and pour into a large Ziploc bag.

Add skirt steak to the Ziploc bag with marinade and allow to marinate up to 6-7 hours max, depending on how thick the meat is.

When ready to grill, liberally season with salt and pepper.

Grill until golden brown and perfectly charred, then allow to rest before slicing on a cutting board.

For the Chimichurri:

Add all of the ingredients to a heavy duty blender or food processor and blend until everything is chopped up and smooth, then serve. Seriously that easy.

Chef's notes:

After grilling your steak and allowing it to rest is the best time to cut it. Take your steak and always cut against the grain in thin slices.
